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





HISTORY OF KONARK SUN TEMPLE, ODISHA

Though the original temple was built by Purandara Kesari (in about 1080-90 CE), the current structure was built in 1250 CE under the reign of Eastern Ganga King Narasimha Deva I. The temple continued to be in worship till 1570s, as mentioned in Ain e Akbari! However, by 1573, Kalapahada raided Konark and the building fell into disuse. By 1620s the deities here were shifted to Purushottam temple, over time, with lack of maintenance, the Deula / Tower collapsed!

FACTS & MYTHS ABOUT KONARK SUN TEMPLE

In the entryway is the 2 mighty monolithic Gaja-Simha (a human crushed by an elephant (gaja) which is in turn crushed by Simha (lion) on either side of the staircase).

There are several philosophical and moral stories that float around about the symbolism, as explained by many guides, but none have any literary mention. The extremely unusual things I've read about Konark include,

1) Presence of a magnet in the Siva Lingam that made a crystal above float... to the sunrays falling on the lingam 365 days a year (yeah, more often, this fake forwarded message, is accompanied by a digitally altered image of Angkor Wat!! Big no, again none of these have any proof - neither literary nor inscriptions nor sculptures!)

BLACK PAGODA & WHITE PAGODA OF PURI



The architecture is of typical to Orissa, with a Nata mandir, Jagamohana and the towering Deula! The towering Deula (perhaps the tallest when it stood) in black stone was in pure contrast to Puri Jagannath temple's Deula which was painted white - naming them Black Pagoda and White Pagoda. These were used extensively for navigation for sea traders!

ULTIMATE STEP TO PROTECT SUN TEMPLE KONARK

By 1824 CE, only a small portion of the Deula was still standing which too collapsed by 1848 CE. By 1901 CE, Sir John Woodburn (when India was still under British raj) took the ultimate step to preserve the Jagamohana which was still standing - to close all the doors permanently, drill a hole atop and fill the whole structure with sand! It took 3 years to do it and till date, its standing safe!



NATA MANDIRA OF KONARK SUR MANDIR

Soon after you enter is the Nata mandira, whose platform and pillars are still standing, but without a ceiling! A walk around the platform is just breath taking - there are soldiers, dancers, musicians, erotic poses, hunting scenes in slots surrounded by minute filigree work - all in stone!!! I don't know who that gentleman is, but I didn't crop him out of the picture, so you have an idea of the size we're talking about!!! On the platform are 16 (4 x 4) pillars, all carved again with beautiful women and mystical beings!

CHARIOT SHAPED TEMPLE - JAGAMOHANA OF KONARK SUR MANDIR

From there somehow, I manage pull myself to Sun God's chariot shaped Jagamohana! The main structure seen today as the Konark Sun Temple is, only the Jagamohana which was filled with sand! Again here, instead of climbing the staircase, I first went around it! Being chariot shaped, it has wheels all around it and horses in front of it. There are 7 horses (4 on one side and 3 on another), named after each color of VIBGYOR (except B include white), of which only one is in an almost complete state.

There are 24 wheels (12 on each side) all around the platform depicting the 12 Rashis (sun signs)! Each wheel is 2.9m diameter with 8 spokes. While the structure of all the wheels is the same, the sculptural detail in each is different! The axle of the wheels extends out for a foot, though some are broken. At the end of these are miniature sculptures, Narasimha tearing down Hiranyakashipu!!! The and in one was swirling pattern in the thickness of the wheel needs to looked into and spot the animals inside each swirl!!! It's also said that the wheels are sun dials, with the space between each spoke as 3hrs and the whole wheel depicting 24hrs. Holding a stick parallel to the ground, at the center of the axle and measuring its shadow would tell the time! I did not personally try it Sandeepan Dash out and can't vouch for it! Batch 2022

KASHMIR

Mhere Jeaven Touches Earth

"Till the day I reached Kashmir, I wondered why it was called 'Paradise on Earth.' But after reaching there, I realized its amazing landscape and scenic beauty. It has beautiful snow-covered mountains, green valleys, and natural lakes.

Day 1 – Dal Lake

We went to visit Dal Lake, integral to tourism and recreation in Kashmir, named the "Jewel in the crown of Kashmir." The ride was very peaceful and adventurous. In between, we met sellers on boats selling food items and jewelry. Floating boat shopping is very interesting and a rare experience. Boathouses were also popular for a stay though they're more expensive compared to hotels.



Day 2 - Sonmarg

On the second day, we went to Sonmarg, which means "Meadow of Gold." Sonmarg is known to have a lot of significance in the old times as the gateway to the Silk Road, which connected Kashmir and China. It is also a base camp for Ladakh. Due to the high altitude and the tight curves of the road while traveling, I immediately experienced shortness of breath, vomiting and giddiness upon reaching Sonmarg, which took me 45 minutes to settle. From there, our horse-riding trip started to reach the peak of the hill. For the first time in my life, I saw such white snow, so pure and incredible; then, we spent some time on the bank of the Sind River (a tributary of the Jhelum River).

Day 3 - Gulmarg

We went to Gulmarg, which is a "meadow of flowers". The scenery was beautiful, littered with different kinds of flowers. The Gulmarg Gondola is the second longest and second highest cable car in the world. The ride gave me a spine-chilling experience as I felt like I could touch the clouds.

Day 4 - Tulip Garden

We traveled to Park Umaro and Indira Gandhi Memorial Tulip Garden in a local auto-rickshaw. It is the largest tulip garden in Asia. Unfortunately, we didn't see the Tulip Flowers as they are available only during the onset of the spring season. For the first time in my life, I ate an apple directly from the tree.

Cuisine:

During our stay, we had tasted various delicious Kashmiri dishes like Lahabi Kebab, Rogan Josh, Goshtaba, Dum Aloo, and Kahva (herbal tea brewed with saffron and a host of other spices). Being a non-vegetarian, I didn't find much difficulty in food, but pure vegetarian food was hard to come by.

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പശ്ചിമഘട്ടമലനിരയിൽ പെട്ടതാണ് വയനാട്. വയലുകളുടെ നാട് ആണ് പിന്നീട് വയനാടായി മാറിയത്. കോഴിക്കോട് നിന്നും വയനാട്ടിലേക്കു വരുമ്പോള് നട്ടുച്ചയ്ക്ക് പോലും കോടമഞ്ഞ് മൂടി നില്ക്കുന്ന 9 ഹെയര്പിന് വളവുകളുള്ള ചെങ്കുത്തായ ചുരം റോഡിലൂടെയുള്ള യാത്ര ഏറെ മനോഹരമാണ്. ചുരം കഴിഞ്ഞ് മുന്നോട്ട് പോകുമ്പോള് ഇരുവശത്തുമുള്ള തേയില തോട്ടങ്ങൾ മനസ്സു നിറയ്ക്കും. കൂടാതെ കുന്നിൻചെരുവുകൾ നിറഞ്ഞുനിൽക്കുന്ന കാപ്പി, കുരുമുളക് തോട്ടങ്ങൾ ഏറെ കൗതുകമുണർത്തുന്നവയാണ്.

ഇവിടെ കാരാപ്പുഴ,ബാണാസുര എന്നിങ്ങനെ രണ്ട് അണക്കെട്ടുകളാണുള്ളത്. ബാണാസുര അണക്കെട്ട് ഏഷ്യയിലെത്തന്നെ മണ്ണിനാൽ നിർമ്മിതമായ രണ്ടാമത്തെ വല്യ അണക്കെട്ടാണ്. ഏഷ്യയിലെ ഏറ്റവും വലിയ ഒഴുകി നടക്കുന്ന സൗരോര്ജ പ്ലാന്റ് സ്ഥിതി ചെയ്യുന്നതും ഇവിടെ ആണ്.

സമുദ്രനിരപ്പിൽ നിന്ന് 3900 ആടി ഉയരത്തിലുള്ള എടക്കൽ ഗുഹയിൽ BC 6000-ന് മുൻപ് എഴുതപ്പെട്ടതെന്ന് പറയപ്പെടുന്ന ശിലാലിഖിതങ്ങളും ചിത്രങ്ങളും കാണപ്പെടുന്നു.

കബനി നദിയിൽ സ്ഥിതിചെയ്യുന്ന കുറുവ ദ്വീപാണ് കേരളത്തിലെ ഏറ്റവും വലിയ നദീതീര ദ്വീപ് . ഇവിടെ വളരെ അപൂർവ്വയിനം മരങ്ങളും, ഔഷധ സസ്യങ്ങളും, പക്ഷികളും, മത്സ്യങ്ങളും കാണപ്പെടുന്നു.ഇവിടെ മുള കൂട്ടിക്കെട്ടിയുണ്ടാക്കിയ ചങ്ങാടത്തിൽ വെള്ളത്തിലൂടെയുള്ള യാത്ര ഒരിക്കലും മനസ്സിൽ നിന്നു മായില്ല.

ഗോത്രത്തനിമ നിറഞ്ഞു നിൽക്കുന്ന "എൻ ഊരു" മനുഷ്യനിർമിതമായ ഗ്രാമമാണ് . എപ്പോഴും ചാറ്റല്മഴ പെയ്യുന്ന, ഇരുവശവും വനനിബിഡമായ കാട്ടുവഴികളിലൂടെയുള്ള ജീപ്പ് യാത്രയ്ക്ക് ശേഷം മലമുകളിലെത്തി അവിടെ ഗോത്രവര്ഗക്കാരുടെ തനതായ സംസ്കാരശൈലി വിളിച്ചോതുന്ന വീടുകളും, പാത്രങ്ങളും, ഉപകരണങ്ങളും, ആഭരണങ്ങളും കണ്ട് അവരുടെ ഭക്ഷണങ്ങളും കഴിച്ച് താഴെ ഇറങ്ങുമ്പോൾ, താഴ്വര കാണാനാകാത്ത തരത്തിലുള്ള കോടമഞ്ഞും കണ്ണെത്താദൂരം ഉയർന്ന മലകളും ഏറെ അതിശയമുളവാക്കുന്നതാണ്.

ബന്ദിപ്പൂർ ടൈഗർ റിസർവിനോട് ചേർന്ന് കിടക്കുന്ന, കേരളത്തിലെ രണ്ടാമത്തെ ഏറ്റവും വലിയ വന്യജീവിസങ്കേതമായ മുത്തങ്ങ 345 കിലോമീറ്ററിൽ പടർന്നു കിടക്കുന്നു.ഫോറെസ്റ്റ് ഡിപാർട്മെന്റിന്റെ കീഴിൽ നടത്തപ്പെടുന്ന ആനപ്പുറത്തേറിയുള്ള സവാരി മൃഗങ്ങളെ തൊട്ടടുത്തു കാണാൻ അവസരമുണ്ടാക്കിത്തരുന്നു.



The state has a long and rich tradition of art and culture. Uttar Pradesh is home to a number of traditional performing arts, including kathak and sitar music.


There are also a number of folk traditions, such as the Holi festival, which are still widely celebrated.



JOURNEYING THROUGH THE ABODE OF CLOUDS **MEGHALAYA**

Meghalaya is in the northeastern India, one of the seven sister states known for its rich cultural heritage and diverse ethnic communities. The culture of Meghalaya is vibrant, reflecting its people's traditions, rituals, and unique lifestyle. The place is inhabited by three major tribal communities: the Khasis, Garos, and Jaintias, with uniqueness from the rest of the states of India, symbolizing the 'Unity in Diversity of India.'

Meghalaya follows a matrilineal system, where family descent and inheritance are traced through the mother's line, and it is considered one of the largest surviving matrilineal societies in the world. Women hold significant social and economic

positions in the community, and property is often passed down to daughters instead of sons. The children take their mothers' surnames, and husbands stay in the mothers-in-law's house or separately after marriage. I even found most of the shops and local businesses run by women during my visit to Meghalaya.


Meghalaya's traditional music and dance forms are integral to cultural expression. The Khasis celebrate their music through instruments like the 'Ksing' (a flat drum), 'Ka 'Jingrwai Lawbei' (a flute-like instrument), and 'Orchestra' (a collection of different instruments).



Regarding scripts, the major tribal communities of Meghalaya traditionally did not have scripts. Notably, the Khasi language now has its script called 'Khasi

Script,' developed in the late 19th century by Thomas Jones, a Welsh missionary using Roman letters.

The Capital city: Shillong Upon arriving in Shillong, the capital of Meghalaya, I was immediately charmed by its pleasant weather and scenic beauty in summer. The bustling markets in the Police bazaar, adorned with vibrant local handicrafts, offered a glimpse into the region's rich cultural heritage. I enjoyed exploring local eateries, savoring delicious



Khasi cuisine, and interacting with the warm and friendly locals. The Khasi women wear Jainsem, which looks like an apron. The staple food/Jingbam(Khasi language) is rice with meat, particularly pork, and dishes made with rice for breakfast like jadoh, putharo, and pumaloi. On festive occasions, they often eat their meals with famous red tea/Lal cha(Khasi) or rice beer. Overall, the culture of Meghalaya is deeply rooted in its tribal traditions, matrilineal society, music, dance, and colorful festivals. It is a treasure trove of cultural diversity and offers visitors a unique insight into the state's rich heritage.

Chasing Waterfalls

Embarking on a day trip to explore Meghalaya's famed waterfalls, I went to the breathtaking Nohkalikai waterfalls with an agonizing story behind its name—the majestic Nohkalikai, plunging from great heights into a deep blue pool. These waterfalls' sheer force and beauty left me in awe as the clouds slowly raised the curtain to show me its panoramic view. The next waterfalls I visited were seven sister waterfalls and many more throughout the way with gushing sounds playing music for me.

Living Root Bridge of Sohra / Cherrapunjee

Venturing into the rain-soaked village of Cherrapunjee, I embarked on a thrilling trek to witness the remarkable living root bridges. These natural wonders, formed by tree roots, showcased a unique blend of nature and human ingenuity. Crossing these bridges, suspended over gushing rivers, was an exhilarating experience that filled me with a sense of admiration for the local communities


and their sustainable practices to preserve nature.



Sawan, also known as Shravan, holds immense importance for Hindus as a holy month dedicated to Lord Shiva. This period is marked by fasting, offering prayers, and consuming specific 'Vrat' recipes. While these traditions have deep-rooted religious significance, there are also scientific reasons behind the practices observed during this time. Let's explore the scientific rationale behind the customs associated with Sawan.





Lord Shiva and the Samudra Manthan:

The story of Samudra Manthan, where the milky ocean was churned in search of the nectar of immortality, plays a vital role in understanding the significance of Lord Shiva during Sawan. During this event, Lord Shiva consumed the potent poison, Halahal, to protect the universe. As a result, his throat turned blue, earning him the name Neelkantha. To calm the effects of the poison, gods and demons offered Gangajal (water from the Ganges) to Lord Shiva. This event, believed to have occurred during the Shravan month, inspires devotees to observe fasts and offer Gangajal to the Shivling.

Avoiding Non-Vegetarian Food:

During Sawan, it is customary to abstain from consuming non-vegetarian food and alcohol. Several reasons contribute to this practice.

1. Respect for Aquatic Creatures:

As the monsoon season provides favorable breeding conditions for aquatic creatures, refraining from eating seafood during Shravan. was traditionally seen as a gesture of respect. It was considered inappropriate to harm or kill these beings, especially when they were pregnant or laying eggs.



2. Digestive System and Immunity:

The monsoon season is characterised by reduced sunlight, which can lead to a deficiency of Vitamin D in the body. Since our bodies are made up of various natural elements, such as air, sunlight, soil, and water, the absence of one element can impact our overall functioning and immunity. The digestive system tends to slow down, making it challenging for the body to digest non-vegetarian food. Thus, opting for lighter and Satvik (pure) food is considered beneficial.

3. Water-borne Diseases:

Sawan coincides with the rainy season when waterborne diseases become more prevalent. The belief is that non-vegetarian food items have a higher risk of contamination during this time. To avoid potential infections and stay healthy, people prefer consuming food that reduces the risk of water-borne diseases.





4. Staying Fit:

In the past, excessive rainfall during the monsoon season often forced people, especially farmers, to stay indoors and reduce physical activity. This sedentary lifestyle could lead to weight gain and digestive issues. To maintain good health, individuals would rely on a light 'vegetarian diet during this time.

5. Religious Festivals:

Sawan is also a month filled with important Hindu festivals such as Rakshabandhan, Teej, Krishna Janmashtami, and Naag Panchami. To maintain consistency and follow the same dietary practices throughout the month, people often adhere to a specific system.

While some may view these rituals as blind adherence, it is crucial to understand the origins and the impact they have on one's life. The customs and practices associated with Sawan blend religious significance with scientific reasoning. By observing these traditions, individuals not only pay homage to Lord Shiva but also prioritise health, respect for life, and overall well-being during this auspicious month.."

CHRONICLES OF MEDICINE

"Poorly nourished, pale, weight 30kgs, odour of acetone on his breath, appeared dull, talked rather slowly, quite willing to lie down all day." One senior medical student gave a blunt and grim prognosis.

" All of us knew that he was doomed."

At the start of the 20th century, a diagnosis of type 1 diabetes mellitus meant certain death. Little could be done for patients, other than to put them on a starvation diet of 450 calories a day!! People slipped into coma, died of starvation with no other treatments available.

Around 1921, Frederick Banting and Charles Best succeeded in isolating a hormone called "INSULIN" which seems to be responsible for the carbohydrate regulation in our body. This extraction is done from a dog's pancreas, Later joined John MacLeod in this research of the two Tornoto University scientists. They conducted their research in faster and efficient way.







But yet once again they encountered problems with the impurities of their extract that was causing inflammation in a patient, L. Thomson, a ketotic diabetic patient. But J. Collip, their biochemist collaborator, prepared a cleaner insulin free from impurities, using alcohol to be exact. With this Thomson's dangerously high blood glucose levels dropped to near normal levels.

Following this, the medical firm Eli Lily started largescale production of insulin. This insulin was the first genetically Engineered, synthetic "human" insulin using E.coli. The bio synthetic human insulin did not cause any allergic reactions like it did with pig and cattle's insulin. It went popular under the name "HUMULIN." From humalog to novolog and insulin pens to pumps, it was a long way!







PR: Dr. Poongodi JV: Dr. Jyoti Verma RS: Dr. R Suncel

🔊 Why and when did you choose pathology as your main interest?

PR: At the end of my internship, I found myself deeply interested in OBG, dermatology, and pathology, Following the completion of my 6-month internship, I took entrance exams for PGI, Chandigarh, and JIPMER. The PGI results were the first to be released, and I was getting pathology at that time.

JV: While preparing for my exams I realised it is occupying a central position and all the departments are surrounding it because each and every department needs to have that discussion with pathology.

RS: Actually, my department of choice was paediatrics. I tried but I could not get. Then finally I decided I want to do anything in Central Institute either PGI or JIPMER. I got in JIPMER but I thought I will try once more. So, then I got in PGI, PGI is best for pathology

N How does your branch differ from other branches?

PR: Operating predominantly within a laboratory environment, pathology focuses on comprehending the underlying mechanisms of diseases, diagnosing them, and aiding in treatment decisions. This sets it apart from various pre and paraclinical disciplines

JV: The first thing is it is a very colourful branch because you would deal with all specific and very colourful stains and all. We are not directly associated with patients but yes, we play a very important role in diagnosing their problems, diseases.

RS: Our branch is known for diagnostics, based on our diagnosis, Surgeons or technicians will treat the disease, of course micro-biology is also a diagnostic branch, but histopathology is the gold standard

S For whom is this an ideal branch?

PR: A pathologist's responsibilities typically take place behind the scenes, with the efforts and diagnostic skills often going unnoticed. Therefore, those who harbour fewer expectations but are deeply dedicated to their work are well-suited for this field.

JV: Those who want to live a lifestyle, those who want to understand the pathogenesis of the disease, those who want to prevent occurrence of disease, they should be well-suited for this field

RS: So, if you want a cool life, once you become faculty. Not when you are JR or not when you are SR.



S The most common procedure is examining a slide, are there any long-term problems of viewing the microscope continuously?

PR: A common challenge faced by numerous pathologists involves back pain, often resulting from extended periods of maintaining a static posture while using a microscope. Some individuals may also encounter eye strain, although innovations in microscope technology such as the incorporation of infinity optical systems, LED illumination, and ergonomic viewing angles have helped alleviate this issue. Despite these advancements, it's crucial to uphold proper ergonomics, periodically rest the eyes through short breaks, and ensure adequate lighting conditions in order to effectively



PR: Questioning the 'why' behind every statement and actively seeking answers stands as an effective approach to mastering any subject. During exams, the primary objective revolves around scoring points. This entails studying previously posed questions, emphasizing prevalent illnesses, and concentrating on a handful of pivotal organ systems that carry significant weight in the assessments.

JV: Yes, obviously but both are like different sides of the same coin. The thing is theory you have to have a very theoretical approach meaning to say you should know all the name, terminologies, to write an exam, to pass that exam, theory has to be collaborative with practical approach too. See, practical approach meaning to say how to go forward, how to approach a particular thing in what way you are going to because ultimately skills are important.

RS: No. Approach will be same. Once you read the theory, then you will understand what is there. You should see, you should read and you should compare with the slide, then only you will understand.

🕥 what role does the department play in the patient care?

PR: Understanding the significance of pathology in patient care necessitates a grasp of its primary divisions: Histopathology, Cytopathology, Haematology, and Immunopathology. This diversity underscores the multifaceted role it plays.

Among these branches, the most pivotal role lies in the conclusive histopathological diagnosis of diseased tissue, a determination that profoundly influences treatment strategies. However, the scope of this role extends beyond diagnosis, encompassing the evaluation of prognosis and predictions for therapeutic outcomes.

Within the context of patient care, collaboration is key, involving a multitude of disciplines. In this collaborative effort, pathologists occupy a substantial and indispensable position, their contributions extending well beyond mere diagnosis and playing a vital role in the broader realm of healthcare.

RS: So, if you give the correct diagnosis. Patient will get proper treatment. If Fungus is there and if you don't report as fungus. They also don't know what is there.


So, everything, Antibiotic, antifungal. Everything will be given. So unnecessarily all the drugs will be given for patients. So, if fungus. What fungus exactly. If lymph nodes are involved, they will send for squamous carcinoma of tongue. If lymph node involvement is there, the staging will change. So, they are exactly what lymph nodes involved. That one you should see properly. And you will tell. Thyroid also same thing. On cytology if you give malignancy. Suspicious malignancy or malignancy PTC. Then they will do neck dissection also- Lymph node dissection. If it's benign they won't do lymph node dissection. So, like that only frozen sections they will send. While operating they will send one tissue. The margin is involved or not. If it is involved, they will do further section. If it is free then they will stop there.

After working in this department for the last few years, what do you feel are the shortcomings that the pathology branch/department needs to overcome in the coming years?

PR: Shortcomings regarding PG curriculum: In the PG curriculum, akin to the brief training periods in clinical biochemistry, microbiology, and blood transfusion, a condensed training stint in radiology, general medicine, surgery, and dermatology would greatly enhance understanding of physicians' and surgeons' requirements. This would facilitate interpreting radiology reports and comprehending radiology images, aiding pathologists in formulating comprehensive differential diagnoses. Likewise, basic knowledge of dermatology would empower general pathologists to effectively address routine skin cases. Furthermore, for departments lacking flow cytometry, cytogenetics, and molecular techniques, arranging observer ship training at external institutes becomes crucial for acquiring expertise in these domains during their postgraduation.

Regarding shortcomings in Pathology branch: For holistic pathology support, the integration of cutting-edge equipment with evolving tests holds paramount importance. Workflow efficiency can be impeded by gaps in technology. Notably, a clear field deficiency is exposed when tests are partitioned between in-house and outsourced due to equipment inadequacy. Additional issues encompass staffing challenges, misinterpretation due to training gaps, and restricted research opportunities due to resource limitations.


